1- ADD VISUAL DEPTH TO YOUR **DESIGN**

There are few design elements that will make your design stand out: bright color, extravagant architecture, or a bold pattern. Patterns add visual interest. Whether you have a natural floral pattern or a geometric one, they draw the eye and give the room purpose. They ground the design. Geometric patterns bring a sense of the now into your design. So unless you want to go ultra-traditional, they are a perfect fit for transitional designs and modern designs. Choose a pattern that works with your color scheme. 2- BALANCE YOUR SPACE WITH PATTERN



What is Marquetry?

Marquetry is the art of creating designs and pictures out of carefully fitted pieces of thin wood. Using precisely cut pieces that fit together perfectly, craftspeople create elaborate designs and pictures using only the wide variety of colours and grains that exist in different wood species.

The definition between marquetry and inlay often engender confusion. All marquetry can be described as inlay because each individual component can be said to be 'inlayed' into each other. Conversely, true inlay can never be defined as marquetry as it is composed of segments in which a space is first chiselled into the solid ground to be then filled with a piece cut to fit.

Wood

Some of the more-commonly used woods in the field of marquetry include maple, oak, mahogany, walnut, ash, wenge, merbau.



Non wood materials such as marble, ivory, gems and steel could be mixed with the wood to create unique designed marquetry. Ideal woods for marquetry feature straight grain; resistance to expansion, contraction and warping; and a resistance to splitting and chipping when they're

Techniques

Because of its complexity and delicacy, marquetry had to be done by hand for centuries. Pieces of wood were carefully cut out using small jigsaws, then carved or sanded to fit together. In the modern era, laser techniques have been developed that drastically reduce the amount of time required to make a marquetry floor. Installing floors was traditionally done by hand by carefully gluing the pieces down on a subfloor, but this process is also becoming increasingly automated—for example, with the creation of prefabricated marquetry panels in wood shops.

Uses of Marquetry

Marquetry has traditionally been an expensive luxury, and floors that feature it are usually found in castles, public buildings and very expensive homes. In places such as Windsor Castle, elaborate marquetry is used to beautify the floors and glorify the monarchy that the building represents. Marquetry can be used to accent the dimensions of a room--for example, by laying a marquetry border around the edges of a room--or in purely decorative ways, such as covering an entire floor with geometric patterns.











What is Chevron Parquet Flooring?

Just like herringbone parquet, Chevron is among the most popular and prized Parquet Flooring patterns. In the past years, the Chevron parquet pattern starts gaining popularity again and become a trend in the parquet flooring industry. Because of its elegant look and number of options regarding sizes, grades, and finishes, Chevron Parquet flooring is desired Parquet Pattern flooring for many households.

Chevron Parquet Origin & History

The chevron pattern is also known as point de Hongrie (or Hungarian herringbone), after a kind of embroidery stitch (known as Flame Stitch) that came into style during the 16th century. The Flame stitch a design, rather than a type of fabric. One theory that historians have about the origins of the flame stitch is that it emerged from the marriage of two embroidery stitches popular in the 13th and 14th centuries: the Gobelin (or brick stitch) and the Hungarian (or zigzag stitch). The resulting combination was a favorite of Princess Elizabeth of Hungary, who traveled to Perugia, Italy, so often that some believe this is how the flame stitch became so popular in Italy. The same applies to the name of the pattern, even though it was indeed more popular in Italy it has been named Hungarian after the Princess Elizabeth of Hungary.







One of the early references of The Chevron Parquet flooring is by the Swedish architect Nicodermus Tessin, in his description of the palace of Versailles in the 1690s. He wrote that there was only one room at Versailles where the parquet was laid in squares. The common belief is that he might have been referring to the Queen's Guard's Room, the only room with chevron Parquet floors instead of the now-famous parquet de Versailles.

Parquetry arrived in England in the 17th Century with Queen Henrietta Marie, who married Charles I. She ordered a major reconstruction and redecoration of her official residence, Somerset House, overseen by Inigo Jones, bringing a touch of the French court to England.

Herringbone and chevron parquet flooring continued to be a popular choice throughout the 18th and 19th century, most notably in Paris during the Haussmann era when much of the city was rebuilt in a large scale urban planning effort. Many of the new apartments featured herringbone and chevron parquet floors.
